According to their website, they have a NO DENIAL policy which would seem that they will take everyone including disruptive, DANGEROUS, & excessive behaviors (which is the wording from their website.. that they just recently removed).

I live on Cavaliare where the other facility is. I cannot believe that in our residential neighborhood, someone can sneak a business like this in. This is very close to living nextdoor to a juvenile correction institute. No one wants that, least not at the end of a hard day.

Saying that this is no different than a "bad neighbor" or a neighbor with a noisy dog is an unfair comparison. This is a money making facility where no mentally unstable patients will be turned away being deliberately being brought in to disrupt the peace of our neighborhoods.

There have been a number of police & ambulance visits on Cavalaire Ct. The street is packed with parked cars. I live on the corner and almost daily, nearly get hit from someone speeding around the corner into our street or from cars coming up the street that can't see me because of all the parked cars.

We chose to live here because it is back away from main roads and businesses that can bring a bad element. Now, somehow zoning is allowing this? Not everyone lives in a wonderful gated community where everyone has to be announced before they can get onto the property. The rest of us have to work hard often out of town and come home and pick up trash from our yard from the increased foot traffic.

Further, I have worked for a mental health facility before and I do not believe that they would be able to keep 12 possibly dangerous individuals (their words) under control.

This is beyond a bad idea, and I am outraged that it has gotten this far.. and that the crime, littering, parking, police, and ambulance problems are due to the location on our street. If not the residents, but the element that it is attracting.
