## Council approves 2006-07 City budget

### City to create 42 positions in the police and fire departments

The City Council approved the 2006-07 budget in June. The \$279,794,204 budget was written based on Council direction given during a March goal-setting session.

The budget adds 68 new positions in the City, almost half funded by Measure C. The budget would create positions for 22 new police officers, two dispatchers and two police clerks, 16 firefighters and 26 other positions in the City.

Funds from the Measure C half-cent sales tax will be used to fund 19 of the new police positions and 13 firefighter positions. The sales tax increase is expected to raise \$5,371,000 during the fiscal year.

It will take more than a year to fill all of the new public



safety positions.

Mello Roos funds, levied on new developments in Merced, will pay for six police positions and three firefighter positions. One additional police position would be paid for from the City's general fund.

The budget contains \$111.2

million of restricted funds for capital projects, including: \$24.2 million for new water wells, \$7.5 million for work on the Campus Parkway, \$4.1 million for new park projects and more than \$3 million for improvements at the Airport industrial Park.

## Wayfinding signs will show folks the way around town

People will be seeing a downtown historic landmark all over town soon. The Merced Tower Theater will be prominently displayed as part of the new "wayfinding" signs that were recently approved by the City Council.

The signs are intended to help visitors and residents find their way to destinations in the City and the surrounding areas.

The signs will orient peo-

ple to destinations such as the Downtown, Merced College, the County Fairgrounds and UC Merced.

The drawing on the left shows what a sign would look like to identify the destination. The direction signs will have three to four locations listed with arrows pointing out the proper path.

The 14-foot tall signs are part of the 1999 Downtown Merced Strategy plan.

## Watering the lawn and yard? Never on Monday!

The City of Merced has a Water Conservation Ordinance in effect year-round.

The Odd/Even Address system is used to determine watering days.

If your address is an odd number (ending in 1,3,5, 7, or 9) it's OK to water on Sundays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

If you have an even address (ending in

0, 2, 4, 6 or 8) your watering days are Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

Do not water between 11 AM and 7 PM, and never water anytime on Monday.

Remember not to wash down sidewalks, driveways or other outdoor surfaces except when needed to protect health and safety. Buildings may be washed down

once a year.

Use a hose with an automatic shutoff device when washing boats, cars, RVs and trucks.

Do not water plants so much that it causes runoff and flooding.

Repair any broken or leaky irrigation and plumbing systems where water leaks.

### South Merced resident needed for Measure C Oversight Committee

The Measure C Oversight Committee needs one more member to fill out its roster. Eight members have been appointed to the panel that oversees the spending of Measure C sales tax funds and recommends to the City Council how the money is spent. ### City maintains its high ISO firefighting rating



The City has retained its fire protection rank as a Class 2 city from the ISO, a group that grades a community's ability to fight fires. Communities are ranked on a 1 to 10 scale, with Class 1 being the best service possible.

The rating was based on the fire alarm and communications system, the fire department staffing and equipment and the excellent water supply system maintained by the Public Works Department.
